On match days, a trained volunteer for the host team is on duty at the single entrance of the venue to reinforce the need for ALL attendees to complete a self-assessment, register for contact tracing, and adhere to the protocols for hygiene and distancing across the venue (the playing field and wider areas, toilets and club-house etc.). For training sessions, Managers will record attendance AND reinforce protocols of self-assessment checks, hygiene, and distancing. Posters clearly depict direction and distancing requirements for all. Covid-19 information posters are placed in designated locations within the venue (clubhouse, toilets etc.) for all players, officials, parents/carers, coaches, volunteers, and visitors. Best practice Hygiene requirements (handwashing etc.) are being enforced and included in all safety briefings. Players, officials, parents/carers, coaches, volunteers, and visitors have been instructed to wash their hands frequently for at least 20 seconds duration. No handshaking, touching, hugging etc. Best practice Hygiene materials (e.g. hand sanitiser and wipes) are readily available on arrival and departure, and within the clubhouse. All officials, parents/carers, coaches, volunteers have been issued with the Club's policy and guidance on the return to competitive training/fixtures, and information on Covid-19 Government guidance. Guidance from the FA is being followed in its entirety. All Manager/Coaches receive mandatory training on the Club's policy & guidance on Covid-19 and signed acceptance. Participants are reminded to only come to training/fixtures if they are fit and well and to remain at home if they or anyone in their household or support bubble is self-isolating. Parents/Carers and spectators may attend outdoor training and matches subject to social distancing rules and social gathering limits (groups of 30 outdoors) and ONLY provided the host team has in place the necessary volunteers to ensure protocols are adhered to, including a trained match day host, first aider and a cleaning crew. All spectators must not smoke, vape, spit, chew gum, and should avoid shouting or raising their voices. 	M	M	M	Yes

Delivering first aid will likely include the need for the responder to compromise government advised social distancing guidance and come into close contact with a potentially injured player, and this may include cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR). If there is a first aider or other medical personnel present, they should be equipped with the appropriate PPE to be used in the event that they should they need to compromise social distancing guidelines to provide medical assistance. They should have updated themselves on any changes in first aid procedure that will be required as a result of the pandemic. The advice for laypeople and coaches with no formal duty of care/role in first aid delivery has slight deviation from those with a clearly defined pre-arranged role, but still follows strict guidance 12. This guidance has been adapted, where possible, for the football setting. Please refer to your club health and safety officer³ and your club's risk assessment for Covid-19 changes, as well as this guidance to inform your planning and sessions. Injuries during play are to be treated (ideally) by a member of their household or the team Manager/First Aider wearing appropriate PPE. Others will still need to be socially distanced unless a life or limb-threatening injury necessitates compromising guidelines to provide emergency care until the ambulance arrives. Managers (first aiders) must ensure that they have appropriate in-date stocks, including icepacks, PPE etc. in their kit bag. 20	Safe Playing Environment (Equipment, including player's equipment)	Players, coaches, officials, volunteers. (unsafe equipment)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Goals are purchased and maintained to be compliant with FA and BSI guidelines. No metal cup hooks are used. Goals must be anchored to the ground, or weighted, in line with manufacturers and BSI and FA guidelines. Referee should inspect and clear the posts safe prior to play. When goals are not in use, they are put away by managers/coaches and trained volunteers and then stored/locked. General instructions, including manual handling guidance, is given to managers to disseminate. Balls are regularly check for damage and replaced, as necessary. Balls are pumped to correct pressure, as per manufacturers guidelines Appropriate footwear is to be used by players depending on playing surface and weather conditions. All footwear is checked for appropriateness before play and to avoid sharp studs being worn. Shin pads must be worn by players for all football activity. Player's worn jewellery must be removed (not taped-up) by players before any match or training session can begin. Dug outs (if used) and any other structure is a minimum of 2 meters from the pitch. 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21	Safe Playing Environment (State of pitch and extreme weather)	Players, officials (unsafe pitch/environment)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Ground is assessed for safety by groundsmen prior to training and fixtures. Referee and/or Club officials to call off training sessions or fixtures if extreme weather is expected (flood, ice, snow etc.) The pitch and surrounding area are checked before each football activity by the Manager/Coach. Any objects, including fouling, that may cause injury are removed. No dogs' policy is in operation at the Playing Field to limit fouling. 22	UV Exposure (Dehydration and exhaustion)	Players, officials, coaches (injury through exposure to UV)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Players must bring own (named) refillable water bottle - filled with fresh drinking water only - to any football activity. Manager ensures a first aid kit is present at all football activity and that they have an in-date FA emergency aid qualification. Managers ensure players have access to a shaded area while competing, and during breaks in play. Reschedule games where extreme weather (high temperature) is expected. Ovoid peak radiation times between 11am and 3pm to minimise UV exposure. 	M	M	M	Yes



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23	HIV, Aids, and other infectious diseases (blood rules etc.)	Players, coaches, parents/carers (spread infectious diseases through the contact of blood)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The Club adopts a “blood rule”. Any player that receives an open wound, is bleeding, or who has blood on them or their clothes, must immediately leave the playing area to receive medical attention. Players must be substituted in the first instance and play resumes. First aid best practice guidelines apply for first aiders (Risk 18). Although a player may be able to play again later, they cannot go back and play again until the wound is taken care of, bleeding has stopped, and all contaminated equipment has been replaced. If a player refuses to leave even though an official requests they do so this occurs, the official will stop play, and if the player continues to stay after play has ceased, the official will enforce the competition rules, which may include forfeiture of the game. Best practice Hygiene requirements (handwashing etc.) are being enforced and included in all safety briefings. Players, officials, parents/carers, coaches, volunteers, and visitors have been instructed to wash their hands frequently for at least 20 seconds duration. 	M	M	M	Yes
